My teaching philosophy consists of four main objectives: 1) to establish a firm understanding of design principles, theory, and methodology, 2) to encourage learning through exploration and experimentation, 3) to provide a safe and welcoming space for academic development, and 4) to prepare my students to evolve throughout their careers.

I value the opportunity to introduce students to the building blocks of the design process. By teaching students the essential principles and elements of design, I lay the foundation from which they can build their ability to take on any type of design project. I emphasize design theory so students can gain a sense of why designers do what they do. I think it is necessary for them to conduct research and write about their findings so they can engage in critical thinking and make informed design decisions. My class projects usually challenge students to apply design principles and theory so they are able to defend their design choices. I teach students to research and frame a problem, to brainstorm, to create preliminary sketches and models, to iterate and refine their sketches, and to develop their final solutions. By practicing this design methodology, students become adept at systematically tackling school assignments and are prepared for professional projects.

As I reflect on my time as a student, I recognize the important role failure played in my development. I had opportunities to experiment with non-traditional materials, sometimes producing disastrous results. As a teacher, I encourage exploration and experimentation, even to the point of failure, so my students gain a working knowledge of the making process. I believe this active type of learning enables students to be imaginative, to seek new approaches, and to take ownership of their ideas. It teaches them to reassess and make revisions, to be flexible, and to problem-solve. These are all essential skills for professional graphic designers.

I welcome diversity and equity in my classroom and I believe it is my responsibility to create a safe, positive learning environment for all of my students. The classroom setting should encourage students to be courageous, to develop their skills, to think critically, and to develop rich concepts for their work. To that end, one of my first tasks every semester is to get to know each of my students. I learn their names and a little about their background. I ask about their aspirations and goals. I try to create an open atmosphere, where they feel comfortable asking questions and being themselves. In-class critiques are prime opportunities for me to demonstrate inclusive, welcoming behavior while discussing in individual projects. I believe I can set the tone for the interactions within the whole classroom and I'm careful to do that responsibly.

One of my teaching priorities is to prepare my students to grow and contribute to the world throughout their lives. Whenever possible, I create assignments that highlight the designer's influence and social responsibility so they recognize they have more than just an aesthetic impact on the world. I teach my students the value of critical thinking and on-going learning to help them navigate the expanding field of graphic design. I believe it's important for me to demonstrate my own commitment to lifelong learning, as well, so I openly discuss my development as an educator. I participate in personal research projects, attend conferences and workshops, review course evaluations and constantly try to identify areas where I can improve my teaching.

My hope is that I help students see their true potential and find their way to a fulfilling career. I share my love for art and design with my students to inspire them to form a deeper relationship with the arts. I want my students to be inquisitive and engaged throughout their lives, enriched by the techniques, concepts, and activities they participate in while taking my classes.
